Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome to the first issue of the half-termly Woodside Way.

The new academic year is well underway and children are settling in to their class routines and knuckling down to their learning.

Across the school, we have welcomed 35 new children and their families to the Woodside community. We understand that it can take time to get to know us and how things work at Woodside. Our message to all parents and carers is that our work in partnership with you is crucial to your child's learning and the progress that they will make whether that is in their academic learning or in their personal development. We are always ready to listen to your views and learn from your expertise and knowledge.

During the summer holidays, we received the assessment and examination results for our Y11-Y13 learners. Despite the challenges of disrupted education last year and thanks to the hard work of the young people, teachers and parents, all of the children gained qualifications in English, Maths, Science, PSE and a vocational BTEC. Each year we review the qualifications on offer to ensure that in addition to the core subjects, we give choices which suit the children's preferences and abilities. This year we are introducing a new Maths and English qualification to ensure that all learners will continue to have the best opportunities to achieve.

One focus across the whole school for 2021-2022 is to improve and enhance opportunities for reading. We have also invested in a new reading scheme which will be available online for reading at home. There are more details in the article inside this issue.

With the speech and language therapy team, we are also ramping up our use of Signalong and this is another way which you can support your child in their learning and their independence. After the half term break we will be offering demonstrations of Signalong signs via the school YouTube page. We also have staff and pupil Signalong champions for each phase. Their job is to encourage the use of sign across the school and help us all to use the signs correctly. If there is sufficient interest in parent training, then we may be able to run a parent training course after Christmas.

Recently, Oxleas NHS have generously donated 100 iPads which were no longer compatible with Oxleas' systems. These will make a great difference to the children's learning, especially as we are able to add a range of communication and learning apps to the devices. We appreciate all that NHS workers have contributed to all of our lives and we are very grateful indeed for the iPads.

The half term break is coming up. I know that the children and the Woodside team will welcome a few day's rest. Children will return to a full day on Wednesday 3rd November but I am looking forward to seeing you in school for your appointments for the Progress Review Day on Tuesday 2nd November. This is an opportunity for you to spend time with the teacher focusing in on important areas of learning for your child so that together we be sure that we are making the very most of the educational opportunities her at Woodside.

### **Key Stage 3**


This half term, the pupils in key stage three have been learning through the holistic topic which considers 'Where do we belong', with particular focus on our community. The pupils have been developing their knowledge of respect and positive relationships, highlighted in giving thanks for food and thinking of others, and promoting black history month.

In English this term, pupils have been developing reading skills through daily lessons. Pupils have improved their writing skills through descriptive writing and narratives, as well as having regular reading lessons to increase guided reading and comprehension skills.

In Maths this half term, pupils will be learning about number and place value, developing strategies to solve problems and deepening understanding through practical opportunities. The pupils have also been increasing their understanding of telling the time and recognising the value of money.

The key stage three pupils have had amazing practical opportunities within their science lessons in the lab, classrooms and around the school grounds, including investigating fair tests when making slime, melting rocks, making tea bags and waterproof clothing. Pupils have also been learning about light and dark, making shadow puppets and understanding light sources. Within the holistic curriculum, pupils have had the opportunity to take part in PSHE and RSE learning about 'me and my family', learning ball games, team games and trampolining in PE and playing instruments in music. The pupils have been looking at their local community for history and geography, creating pop up books in DT, making delicious foods from different cultures in food technology and learning how a computer works and how to stay safe when using a computer or device in ICT. The pupils have also been learning about places of worship in the community and about Islamic religious traditions.



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### **Key Stage 2**

During this term, KS2 have been learning about Houses and Homes. One of the information texts we have enjoyed reading is 'Homes from Around the World' where we looked at the different types of homes that people live in across the world. We have also enjoyed reading 'The Three Little Pigs,' and making our own simple versions of this story. In Art, we created homes by manipulating clay and using tools to make marks. We also used our understanding of different materials from science to design our own houses.








### EYFS and KS1


We are promoting a love of reading. We celebrate people reading by sharing photos of people enjoying reading in class. We also have photos of staff reading in unusual places. We would love to see where you enjoy looking at a book.

Classes and adults display the titles of the books we are reading so that we can share our enjoyment. We enjoy using our class reading corners and visiting the school library. In EYFS-KS1 we are currently developing a new library just for the youngest children in the school.

We are excited to be starting a new reading scheme across the school. It has lots of exciting books and there is even an interactive section so you can enjoy the books together at home.

To develop story telling skills, some classes are creating their own stories from pictures. We can all make up our own versions. As a learning community we are all learning to sign-there are many ways to join in with a book.

Each class has a working vocabulary of words they are using during lessons or a topic. We are all finding ways to enrich our vocabulary by thinking of other words with a similar meaning, or even thinking about words which mean the opposite and are celebrating new vocabulary, whether it is spoken, written or signed. One class is capturing all of their new words on a tree of knowledge.

- Make sure you and your child know how to block abusive comments and report content that worries them (see below).
- Teach them to respect others online and think about comments before they post them and discuss how easily comments made online can be misinterpreted.
- If your child, or someone else sends threatening, abusive or offensive messages or images via Whatsapp, Snapchat or any other social networking site, they could be committing an offence, and these need to be reported to the police either online (<a href="https://www.met.police.uk/ro/report/ocr/af/how-to-report-a-crime">https://www.met.police.uk/ro/report/ocr/af/how-to-report-a-crime</a>) or telephone 101.
- Don't allow them to meet people in real life that they've only talked to online and remind them that some people may not be who they say they are.
