
EYFS and Key Stage 1






During this term, pupils in KS2 have been learning to follow and write their own instructions for how to make recipes such as a pizza. Iris and Tulip class have been reading 'Perfectly Polite Penguins' and discussing what the best ways of being polite are and why it is important to show this.

Our pupils have been learning about plants in science and have been planting seeds to grow flowers.




Across the department the children have been learning to follow directions in geography. Sunflower class followed directions to visit different places in the school.

Key Stage 3

This half term, the KS3 pupils have been learning about jobs, including those around the home. Everyone has been able to think about how they contribute around the home and classroom, and consider what more they could do. Everyone has had the opportunity to show our core school value of independence through classroom jobs and also through their wonderful school work. It has been great to see pupils growing in independence when completing tasks. Ukraine Day was a huge success and we were able to raise money, donations and awareness to support our friends from Ukraine. We have also been preparing for the Queen's Platinum jubilee, by preparing and planting seeds to grow in the formation of WA to celebrate, which you can see at the front of the school.

Pupils have continued to read more. Teachers have been updating the Big Cat online series of books, so please remember to log on for a personalised library. Writing has focused around instructions, poetry and narratives this term. It has been great to see the progress the pupils have made throughout the year.

KS3 have been developing their knowledge of statistics, data handling and fractions, as well as reviewing addition and subtraction, money and time, in Maths.

In science this half term, KS3 have been learning about animals and their habitats, life cycles and food chains. This topic was made even more memorable by the amazing Zoolab visit, where some pupils were very brave and held or stroked a corn snake, a giant millipede, a giant snail, cockroaches and even rats. We were able to learn about their habitat and diets, which supported our learning this half term.

KS3 have also been exploring colour through art, making plant pots in DT, cooking foods from around the world and considering the values of Judaism and how this links to important jobs and celebrations. We have considered how to stay healthy, including having a healthy body, as part of our PSHE / RSE topic and PE.

Animal day at Woodside Academy







On Tuesday 17 May 2022, the pupils of Woodside Academy had a visit from Zoolab, a company that specialises in engaging pupils in an informative way through their unique animal workshops.

The visit was tailored towards the National curriculum objective, as our KS3 are currently learning about living things and their habitats. It was an opportunity to educate the pupils as well as provide animal therapy and sensory experience. It was amazing to see the faces of the pupils (from early years all the way to post 16) as they looked at the animals close up and touched them.

Pupils who were initially reluctant to come close to the animals, gained enough confidence that they could no longer hold back but came in and held the animals. Pupils were very attentive and asked lots of questions, it was a huge success, according to the feedback below:

'The pupils really enjoyed holding the animals and it kept the pupils interested so that they could all sit and engage together'.

'My class (EYFS/KS1) loved the Zoolab visit yesterday and enjoyed seeing all the animals and getting to touch them'.

'My class (Poppy class - year 3) really enjoyed it. They liked being able to touch the animals.'

'Lily class really enjoyed looking at the animals, the handler was great and the added bonus that they got to touch animals that they normally wouldn't be able to, was a huge success. Although a lot of my class are non-verbal, the smiles on their faces spoke volumes'.

MP visit for SeeAbility @ Woodside Academy to meet our own very important children and young people



Woodside Academy was delighted to host a visit from Sir David Evennett MP today.

The MP for Bexleyheath and Crayford came to the school to see pupils having their eyes tested by SeeAbility – a UK sight charity specialising in supporting people with learning disabilities or autism.

Located in Colyers Lane, Erith, Woodside Academy is a special school for 4-19-year-olds. Part of London South East Academies Trust, the school supports children and young people with ASD and moderate needs.

SeeAbility has been working with Woodside as part of NHS England's programme to establish a Special Schools Eye Care Service. Woodside is one of 90 special schools across the country currently supporting the scheme - and it's already having a fantastic impact.

This new NHS service aims to provide sight tests and glasses in the familiar and convenient environment of special schools. This has come after research by SeeAbility highlighted that half of children in special schools have a sight problem. Yet over four in ten children in special schools have never had a sight test before.

SeeAbility is now helping to introduce this pioneering service and was keen to showcase the positive impact it is having on children and families at Woodside Academy.

After a short tour of the school, Sir David was taken to the sight testing room to observe sight tests and glasses fittings, meeting the SeeAbility optometrist, dispensing optician, staff and children.

Speaking to Woodside Academy staff and children during his visit, Sir David Evennett said: "I'm delighted to have had the opportunity to visit Woodside Academy and meet with the dedicated staff and children. This is a brilliant school and an important part of our Bexley community.

"Regular eye examinations are so important, especially as having your vision corrected can significantly improve the quality of your day-to-day life. I was therefore pleased to have the opportunity to see first-hand the pioneering and very important work SeeAbility are doing in schools like Woodside Academy".





Kathryn Freame, Head Teacher at Woodside Academy added: "We are delighted to host a visit for Sir David to see the important service SeeAbility is providing to our pupils here. Their Eye Clinics are extremely beneficial, enabling the children to have their eyes tested and glasses dispensed in a familiar environment, by an optometrist who understands their needs.

"This is having a such positive impact on our children, improving wellbeing, reading and communication. We are so proud of our school – pupils and staff - so today's visit has been a great opportunity to showcase some of the fantastic work being carried out every day to give the children the excellent education they deserve and to which they are entitled."

Lisa Donaldson, Head of Eye Care and Vision at SeeAbility said: "We are so delighted to showcase this work with our colleagues at Woodside Academy. Thinking creatively about the way eye care services are delivered can mean everyone gets a more equal right to sight – this is so important for children with learning disabilities who are 28 times more likely to have a sight problem than other children."

SeeAbility provides specialist support to enable people with learning disabilities, autism, and sight loss to achieve their ambitions and participate fully in society. It is also the only organisation leading on making eye care more accessible for people with learning disabilities. 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
