

UK weather forecast: Britain on track for hottest July day ever with 37C heat

Britain is on track to have its hottest July day ever, with temperatures expected to hit 36C this week.

The Met Office has predicted that the mercury will rise to 36C in London on Thursday afternoon, as part of a three-day heat-wave hitting the UK today. Forecasters say there could even be temperatures of 37C in south-east England on Thursday.

The sweltering heat is the result of an 'African plume' sweeping in from the south. The heatwave is likely to break the record for the hottest July day in the UK, which was seen in Heathrow in 2015, when temperatures reached 36.8C. Sunshine will cover the country today on what promises to be one of the nicest days of the year, with highs of 32C. Temperatures will be in the low 30s across much of south, south-east, east, central, north and north-east England and south Wales.

Thursday will bring the hottest weather of the week, with highs of 36C, and also a fair share of sunshine. A Met Office spokesman said: "Thursday is expected to see the peak in temperatures with 37C possible in south-east England.






